The pub has received a new kitchen and a face lift and a lovely new white washing on the outside. Serving four beers you'll be sure of a good choice - and when we visited we were not disappointed. On offer was Marstons EPA,

Timothy Taylor Landlord, Wye Valley Butty Bach and Wickwar BOB. So pleased are we as a CAMRA branch with the progress of Steve and Mandy and how they have improved the pub, we felt them worthy of our 'Pub of the Season' Award of Winter

2014/15 and having only taken less than a year to achieve this award is some feat! It only leaves me to wish them on behalf of the branch all the very the best and hope that long may their success continue.

The first to do so was the **HOLLY BUSH** which was bought by Everards and as of this week it is now under the guidance and direction of Nigel Smith from **THE FLEECE** in Bretforton ably assisted by Tom behind the bar. With up to four Everards beers supplemented by up to four others freely chosen by Nigel it is now well placed again to maintain the high standards it previously achieved in the community.

Whilst mentioning high standards, it was also a real pleasure to hear of developments at **THE THREE TUNS** which officially opened on the 6th March with the licensee being Mandy Downes from **THE GROSS KEYS**. With nine hand pumps on the bar, three of which are currently selling cider or perry, the overall choice of beers in Alcester is now once again quite impressive and well worth an evening out and about town to find out for yourselves.

Finally can I please remind you that the beer festival is being held over the weekend of the 12th / 13th June this year and we are looking for members to help us in a variety of different ways in order to make this a success. Alcester

THE HOLLY BUSH

Well, in the last Shakesbeer we were painting a very sad story. It had closed without warning and the future was looking



very bleak! To our great surprise we need not have been glum. The pub was sold to Everards who reopened it before Christmas with a temporary manger in place and then set about a small "clear out" and light refurbishment. In the meantime they also set about looking for a permanent tenant. Fast forward to March 2nd and much to our delight this pub is now under the stewardship of Nigel Smith who has put in place manager Tom Walker from one of his other pubs, THE FLEECE INN, multi award winning pub. Nigel now has a small empire forming including in THE **CARDINALS HAT** in Worcester. At **THE HOLLY BUSH** you will find a 50/50 tie between Everards and free pumps. A few more works are to take place to bring the old building back ship shape. The hunt is also on for a quality chef to allow the kitchen to fire on all cylinders. You will also find WiFi throughout. In its early days under new guidance, the beer range has not disappointed and a cask of Sarah Hughes Dark Ruby Mild and Bathams Best Bitter was available. Myself, I visited here a week ago to find an exceptional pint of

North Cotswold Best Bitter. So what can we say - it looks like the Fleecy magic has rubbed off on this former CAMRA award winning pub. We wish Nigel, Tom and The Holly Bush team all the best and long may it continue.

THE THREE TUNS

March 7th saw the long awaited reopening of this once popular pub, it is now under the guidance of Mandy Downes who readers may know from the **THE CROSS KEYS** just around the corner. It has opened with nine hand pulls serving cider and perry and up to six ales. They too have had the much coveted Bathams Best Bitter and on my recent visit I was very pleased with a pint of Hobsons Shropshire Stout.



THE SWAN HOTEL

After a somewhat shaky existence this pub-cum-hotel has finally closed its doors on February 28th with a small party for local followers. At the time of writing the establishment is up for lease noted as having "flexible terms" and we think this place should be a gold mine as there is a real lack of hotel rooms in the area. We understand the landlord here has departed to care take **THE TRUMPET** in Evesham.

THE WHITE LION

After a good stint of 10 years here, Dave and Sharon Lloyd are moving on at the end of June to northern pastures to take on a new pub venture. They were awarded 'Branch Pub of the Season' Summer 2011 after being recognised for introducing real ale to the pub and then actually increasing the real ale sale to require more hand pumps. Partaking in the national festivals



that happen — National Pie Week, Sausage festivals and more, backed up by local brewery tap take overs, they will be sorely missed. We understand that the lease has been taken on by an unknown that has around a dozen others who will put in a "manager" — we wait to see if they can keep up the standards in this great pub!

Broadway

BROADWAY HOTEL

Our reporter visited here around Christmas time and let us know that there are two regular Wickwar beers, normally BOB and Cotswold Way with guests of Hooky Bitter and others rotating.

HORSE AND HOUND

This high street pub continues to offer four ales consisting of *Sharps Doombar*

and *Purity Mad Goose* as regulars and two other rotating guests from the Enterprise ales list.

LYGON ARMS HOTEL

Sadly here we still see no hand pull, maybe one day...

THE SWAN HOTEL

A popular food pub, they are maintaining three hand pulls with staple regulars - Doom Bar and Purity Ubu along with interesting guests such as Harvistoun Bitter and Twisted or Betty Stogs.

THE CROWN AND TRUMPET

This regular award winning Cotswold pub needs no introduction and you will always find three ales, two ciders and a perry here. Andrew Scott, Landlord has returned to one of his favourites *Timothy Taylor Landlord*. Also here are two local ale contenders *Stanway Artists Ale* and *Stroud Tom Long*. This is worth a walk around the corner from the high street.

Childswickham Childswickham inn

This less reported pub is easily found on the Evesham Rd to Broadway. A smart looking inn and brasserie, you will find good food here and likely two ales - normally *Doom Bar* and *Hook Norton Old Hooky*. As the weather warms up you'll find a pleasant garden with seating on decking. Worth straying off the beaten track.

Evesham

THE TRUMPET

We have learnt the fate of this Hook Norton town centre pub is looking shaky once more, having only been reopened for just under a year. There is a Waitrose development next door and rumours are that the developers are in talks with Hooky to buy it and encompass in to the shop development. In the mean time we say farewell to Charles and Kate Stewart who have headed north to Liverpool to set up a new venture. In the meantime it is rumoured the landlord from **THE SWAN**, Alcester will take over a short termination notice lease until its fate is decided.

ANGEL VAULTS

Two handpumps are available here with *Doom Bar* being the regular which is joined by *Tribute* at the weekends and in the summer. Currently going through Cask marque status where stage one has been completed.

AMBER CAFE

Sadly here we report there is no longer real ale available and the pumps have been removed.

BEAR

Two handpumps are available here with *Hooky Lion* on one and a real cider *Old Rosie* on the other. Hooky is a rotating guest.

BBC/ECGWINS CLUB

The regular beer here is now *Doom Bar* with two rotating guests where the policy is a "house guest" below 4% and another "quest" above 4%.

OLD RED HORSE. 17 VINE ST

Beers here are found to be sourced from the SIBA independent list with a *Purity Ubu* often found here.

NORTHWICK HOTEL

Now has two handpumps with the regular beer being *Wadworth 6X*. The second handpump is said to be in operation during summer months with *London Pride*.

THE ORCHARD, TWYFORD ROUNDABOUT

Two Real ales usually now available on the three hand pumps taken from a range of nine *Marstons* group beers. For Christmas, as a one off, *Ringwood Reinbeer* was on along with *Jennings Cumberland Bitter* from their "usual" range.

RUBY JACKS. BEWDLEY ST

Remains as no Real Ale available.

STRAWBERRY FIELDS, CHARITY CRESCENT

Three real ales as per our current web site but *Doom Bar* is now regular.

RED LION

If you were looking for any more reasons to visit Evesham's newest pub, you can now get involved in the bi-weekly pub quiz recently started or the monthly music night. A range of *Cannon Royall* beers are always available here with at least one dark one! The new *Comfortably Stout* seems to be going down well, get it while you still can!

North Littleton

THE IVY

We learned just before Christmas this village local had shut its doors, but we understand this has been taken on by local pub extraordinaire Graham who has a number of local pubs under his belt - to name a few THE BEAR, Evesham and THE ROUND OF GRAS Badsey.

Offenham

BRIDGE INN

The beers here are reduced to two beers in the winter, over the Christmas period Bass and Wells / Young Good Stuffing were available to be replaced by other Wells seasonals

FISH AND ANCHOR

Our roving reporter tells us two beers are regularly available here - *Doom Bar* and *UBU*

Barton

THE COTTAGE OF CONTENT

This popular village local has now reopened after a refurbishment including improved and covered access to the toilet



facilities and the introduction of an extra room. Sporting three beers - Hooky Best, Black Sheep Best and Shepard Neame Spitfire, it also seems to have attracted the attention of the local MP! Noted on the blackboard that it is open all day every day from noon subject to licensee's discretion (10.30pm closing Mon/Tue/Sun, 11pm Wed, midnight Thur/Fri/Sat).

Snitterfield Snitterfield Arms

Our reporter ventured out on a cold and misty December lunchtime to find the car park full and had to park in the road. Inside they were welcomed by an open log fire and a choice of three cask beers on handpump. *Greene King IPA* is the regular and there can be three further cask beers which change from time to time. A pint of *Otter Ale* was first rate and *Brakspear Bitter* was also available with *Black Sheep Bitter* just finished.

Wootton Wawen

BULL'S HEAD

Here, our reporter was welcomed by an open fire and found two cask beers on handpump. One was the regular *Anderson's Ale*, badged for the chef / landlord, and at 4.9% was tasted and soon identified as the excellent *Ringwood Fortyniner*. The other beer changes from time to time and is chosen from the

Marstons list (*New World Pedigree* on their visit).

NAVIGATION

There is a lovely canalside garden here which on a summer's day is an attractive place to sup a beer and watch the narrow boats coming and going from the boat hire base. Inside the pub our reporter found Ruddles County (the regular beer) and a second cask ale called "A Good Stuffing" from Wells. This guest ale continually changes.

Tysoe

THE PEACOCK

Has won the top prize for cellar management and beer quality amongst all Punch Taverns nationwide. Landlady Jan who cleans the pipes after every firkin and thereby guarantees a superb pint with a fine head and good cling, tells an amusing story of how her technique was discovered.

Like most Punch Taverns, each beer line is monitored by telemetering so Punch has an up to date record of throughput. This led to a visit from Punch who suspected Jan was "buying in" and avoiding the tie. How else was the meter reading so high? It was easy to explain - the regular cleaning was causing the high reading. The pub opens at 5pm Mon-Fri and all day Saturday and Sunday. On a recent visit the telemetered beers were Adnams Broadside, Exmoor Gold and Brains Bread of Heaven.

Wixford

THE THREE HORSESHOES

After a period of closure, this quaint historic village local is open once again under the guidance of Lucy Lewis who is a local lass born and bred. Food will return shortly and events will begin to fill the calendar. From the off there are four beers

available – currently Wye Valley HPA and Butty Bach, Wells Bombardier and Sharps Doom Bar.

Bearley

RUSTIC KITCHEN AT THE GOLDEN CROSS

Has recently reopened and with a new name which reflects the dedication to good food. Our reporter found a fine pint of *Purity Mad Goose* on handpump on a recent visit. The pub closes on Mondays but is open all day for food and drinks for the remainder of the week.

Edghill

THE CASTLE

This Hook Norton historic house has recently been awarded two AA rosettes after only being open 10 months after a major refurbishment. Quite an accolade as there are only 10% of establishments get one!

Harvington

THE GOLDEN CROSS

Once again this village pub is closed, after just about a year Derek and Lesley Cook have closed the doors on February 22nd with a small party to thank locals. Running costs versus income are blamed for the venture closing.

Great AineMOTHER HUFF CAP

We can report that along with a number of recent reopening's in this area of the branch the Huff Cap is back open again under the stewardship of the Steak and Cider chain who some will know as they run the The Four Alls in Welford, where you are likely to find on offer Old Rosie Cider, Doom Bar, Wye Valley HPA and Purity Gold on handpull along with a competitive priced menu.

LocAle

CAMRA LocAle - promoting pubs that sell locallybrewed real ale, reducing the number of 'beer miles', and supporting local breweries. CAMRA LocAle is an initiative that promotes pubs stocking locally-brewed real ale. The scheme builds on a growing consumer demand for quality local produce and an increased awareness of 'green' issues.

The CAMRA LocAle scheme was created in 2007 by CAMRA's Nottingham branch which wanted to help support the tradition of brewing within Nottinghamshire, following the demise of local brewer Hardys and Hansons. Following on from our Locale feature in Shakesbeer Spring 2013 we will be keeping you up to date on the most recent Locale accredited pubs. Below are our most recent locale conscriptors and so you should be able to track down a pint of beer produced with 30 miles of that pub.

Everyone benefits from local pubs stocking locally-brewed real ale...

- Public houses as stocking local real ales can increase pub visits
- · Consumers who enjoy greater beer choice and diversity
- · Local brewers who gain from increased sales
- The local economy because more money is spent and retained locally
- · The environment due to fewer 'beer miles' resulting in less road congestion and pollution
- Tourism due to an increased sense of local identity and pride let's celebrate what makes our locality different

Accreditation is at the sole discretion of the local CAMRA branch and subject to the licensee agreeing to the following...

- That they will endeavour to ensure at least one locally brewed real ale, as defined by the local branch, is on sale at all times
- Only real ale, as defined by CAMRA, can be promoted as a CAMRA LocAle
- Where the standard of real ale sold falls below an acceptable quality, accreditation will be withdrawn
- That accreditation can be withdrawn at any time at the discretion of the local branch
- That should accreditation be withdrawn, or should the licensee withdraw from the scheme, all LocAle publicity material must be removed from the pub and the licensee cease using the CAMRA LocAle logo.

Definition of Local

The Sustainable Communities Act, which CAMRA strongly supports, provides a definition of local as up to 30 miles from the point of sale. CAMRA recommends that the distance is calculated from the pub to the brewery and should be based on the shortest driving distance. Real ales from regional and national breweries as well as from microbreweries can be

regarded as "local" if they are brewed within what the branch has decided as being the local area.

How do I find a LocAle Pub?

Pubs which have been given LocAle status by their local CAMRA branch can display the LocAle sticker on their windows/doors. The stickers have the

year for which they have been accredited as LocAle pubs by their branch. They may also have posters up in the pub and on the pumps that are serving locally brewed beers there will be LocAle pump clip crowners.

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
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Far from it these days, we also have a few of breweries local and within the branch producing some lovely milds: *Church End Gravediggers Ale* and *North Cotswold Mayfair Mild*; to find out others that you can expect to see, checkout the CAMRA mild site...

Milds are black to dark brown to pale amber in colour and come in a variety of styles from warming roasty ales to light refreshing lunchtime thirst quenchers. Malty and possibly sweet tones dominate the flavour profile but there may be a light hop flavour or aroma. Slight diacetyl (toffee/butterscotch) flavours are not inappropriate. Alcohol levels are typically low. Pale milds tend to have a lighter, fruitier aroma with gentle hoppiness. Dark milds may have a light roast malt or caramel character in aroma and taste. Scottish cask beers may have mild characteristics with a dominance of sweetness, smooth body and light bitterness.






Brewery News...

STRATFORD-UPON-AVON **RRFWFRY**

Well it might be easier to start this with what Richard Williams has NOT been up to with the brewery and the beers.



Since we last reported on his activities, Rich has seen the demand for his beer increase to levels that well surpass his expectations. So far the beer has been seen in a large number of local pubs ... THE FLEECE. STRATFORD ALE **HOUSE. THE BEAR FREE HOUSE.** THE NORMAN KNIGHT. THE BELL Alderminster, STRATFORD ARTS **HOUSE. THE FUZZY DUCK. ROSE AND CROWN Ratley, WILMCOTE SPORTS AND SOCIAL, THE BOARS HEAD** Hampton Lucy, **THE HARVESTER** Long Itchington, CHURCH ST TOWN **HOUSE, THE WILD BOARD** Warwick, THE OLD POST OFFICE Warwick. THE **GOLDEN BEE. THE TURKS HEAD** and THE WHIPPET INN Lichfield... to name just a few!







Beer was also accepted in to two winter ale festivals –Tewkesbury Winter Ales run by Gloucestershire CAMRA and the CAMRA National Winter Ales held at the wonderful Roundhouse Derby, where all four beers were present achieving a sell out with the Malty Pig on the Friday night. A full range of beers will also be available at this year's Shakespeare branch festival at the racecourse.

Since the first time I went to meet Rich, this unprecedented demand has necessitated the need to buy bigger brewing kit, trebling capacity. So impressed were THE BELL, Alderminster, that they have

commissioned the brewery for the own house brew, Alscot Ale.

I hope I have captured everything here, I am unsure how three months can see so much activity!

A charity which is very dear to the Williams family will have a beer named for them which will be sold at their events to raise money for 353.org.uk to help the military community. This trust commemorates Private Conrad Lewis' life and is setup and run by his parents after he lost his life fighting in Afghanistan – do check out their good work.

NORTH COTSWOLD **RRFWFRY**



reported how busy things have been for NCB and things don't seem to show signs of slowing down yet! The brewery has been utilising the doubling of their capacity since August to great effect. In the run up to Christmas they were working at almost 100% to enable extra stocks to be generated and were only limited by manpower. The increase, plus the use of the new cask washer at ten times the speed, has made for far easier production runs and at increased efficiency rates. They also now have sufficient stocks of casks for their customers. The brewery intends to release a mild in March using English hops at 3.8% called Moreton Mild which is a classic dark mild with a nutty palate. The brewery has also seen visits from several local CAMRA branches including the Shakespeare branch in mid-January. As such is their current popularity in the much improved and consistent beers which are now being produced, they are very pleased with their award for "winner for the festival" for Hung Drawn 'n' Portered at the North Cotswold CAMRA Summer festival 2014.

HOOK NORTON RRFWFRY



Well it seems it's all

systems go for all breweries and Hooky is no exception. Having recently installed a new smaller brew kit for producing crafted beer, they took R B Imperial Stout 10%, Rye IPA 4.5% and Yard Arm 7% along to Craft Beer Rising in London this February and at the international brewing awards, Hooky and Old Hooky won Gold and Silver respectively in the bottled ale competition - for two

very established beers, this is a great accolade. The new Hook Norton Greedy Goose which is a seasonal winter brew. had doubled in expected volumes and due to the

popularity, a limited bottle run will also be produced.

They have also been privileged to run the brewery bar in the House of Commons recently for an event which is an unfamiliar location. This event was for members of the British Beer and Pub Association (BBPA) and members of the Houses of Parliament.





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

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

CAMRA WARWICKSHIRE COUNTY PUB OF THE YEAR 2012

THE NORMAN KNIGhT

he Norman Knight is open seven evenings per week and Tuesday to Sunday lunchtimes serving a choice of up to seven real ales including several brewed on the premises at our award winning Patriot Brewery plus two real ciders and Perry.

The Brewery Double!

The end of January saw Branch members gathering together for what was going to be a memorable day visiting two of the breweries within our Branch. Both Guy Holiday from the **North Cotswold Brewery**, at Ditchford Farm (close to Stretton-on-Fosse), and Tim Young from the **Patriot Brewery**, at the **NORMAN KNIGHT** at Whichford, had both very kindly offered brewery tours and who were we to say no.

ur Branch Social Secretary, John Bloomfield, had made meticulous plans to pick up members from around the Branch by bus and we all were eagerly awaiting our first visit of the day as we bounced down the track leading to the North Cotswold Brewery.

We were warmly greeted by head brewer Guy and his wife Sandra. First things first he said and we marched off to the recently expanded conditioning room for the liquid delights on offer straight from the cask. What a duo and both award winners — the pale hoppy bitter brewed with a blend of three New Zealand hops, *Shagweaver* 4.5% ABV, and the deliciously moorish strong, dark treacle coloured porter, with Bramling Cross hops *Hung, Drawn 'n' Portered* 5.0% ABV.

Whilst the beer eagerly flowed Guy gave us a detailed history of the brewery from its initial start-up in the ex-dairy shed to

how the business has grown over the years and with more investments is still growing stronger every day. With the assistance of DEFRA, brewers, friends and family the brewery was able to undergo a major transformation and increase in capacity in the middle of 2014. Working with DEFRA

Guy was able to calculate the improvements in efficiency too. Previously the brewery had been using about four pints of water used to produce about one pint of beer, but Guy had been able to reduce this to around three pints for each pint produced. Part of

this change saw the installation of a new 26 barrel fermenting vessel which proved a tight squeeze with millimetres to spare through the old dairy stone entrance door. We were shown around the recently refurbished brewing room as Guy explained how cleanliness and consistency were the answer to quality and of course customer satisfaction with the drinker in the pub. The new fermenting vessel benefits from a self-cleaning action, plus the introduction of the cask washer has seen a laborious cask cleaning procedure of 80 casks in a whole day's hard work reduced to 50 casks per hour with a semi-automated washer – what a time and labour saver! The brewery has been concentrating on the core range of four beers and will be


the core range of four beers and will be releasing a Mild brewed with English hops. Brewing starts at the end of February with a launch on 9th March. Keep a look out for *Moreton Mild* at 3.8% ABV. A big thank-you











...and then on to the second brewery, the Patriot at Whichford

Patriot is a classic five barrel micro-brewery, neatly tucked away behind the NORMAN KNIGHT brewery tap, overlooking the village green in Whichford.

After a quiet spell the owner, Tim Young, has enlisted the help of brewer lan from Somerset (where he is a renowned cider maker) to ramp up the brewing volumes back to 2012 levels. Ian describes himself as a traditionalist brewer, balancing Tim's interest in New World hops and new techniques. We can be assured lan and Tim will be continuing the Patriot tradition of interesting, quality beers in the future. Patriot currently supplies four local pubs and two more in Somerset, where Tim and lan now produce organic cider. The increase in beer production will see the



welcome return of 'Nelson', a 4.0% ABV session bitter brewed with a blend of US and English hops.

After Tim showed us around the brewery, we called in to the **NORMAN KNIGHT** where everyone had a pint of freshly brewed *Morris*. Originally a seasonal beer brewed to celebrate May day (Morris dancing), *Morris* is a 3.8% ABV light bitter/pale ale brewed with Maris Otter malt and a single hop - Citra, giving a delicate dry and fruity finish.

We thought it couldn't get any better - great beer and a plate of squid rings around an open wood fire, and then Pete Godfrey found a didgeridoo hanging in the inglenook and gave an enchanting recital, which we think was Mozart's 'Die Furzen Kuh'. Yes, a memorable visit enjoyed by all involved.

We can be assured Ian and Tim will be continuing the Patriot tradition of interesting, quality beers in the future.



BEER DUTY HAT-TRICK!

For the third budget in a row the chancellor has announced a one penny a pint duty reduction on ale and a 2% cut on cider.

This is another monumental success and testament to the thousands of CAMRA members who have supported this Campaign. Working together, CAMRA campaigners like you secured the support of 114 local MPs, which mounted huge pressure on the Chancellor to deliver

another Budget for beer drinkers. As CAMRA members we should be incredibly proud that our efforts are having such a positive effect on the industry as a whole. Independent research by the Centre for Economic and Business Research (Cebr) estimates that the price of a pint will now


be more than 20p cheaper than it would have been had the Beer Duty Escalator remained in place. We will now be urging brewers and pub companies to pass on these savings to consumers.

The Black Swan

Does anyone remember Jake Thackray from the late 1960s and 1970s? Well, if you can't you're not as old as me then! He was a folk singer, songwriter and poet whose surreal and lugubrious songs made him a firm favourite on such television programmes as The Frost Report, Frost Over America, The Braden Beat and That's Life. His work ranged from satirical to bawdy to sentimental, with a strong emphasis on storytelling. He died in 2002, aged 63.

His witty lyrics and clipped delivery, combined with distinctive Yorkshire tones, gravelly voice and hangdog expression were delivered with a mixture of classical and jazz chords. These were played on a nylon string guitar (which often needed re-tuning in large venues such as the London Palladium and the Royal Albert Hall).

His strong Yorkshire accent and the northern setting of many of his songs, led to him being described as the "North Country Noël Coward". Others compared him with Flanders and Swann, "who are wordy, funny writers". However, his style was derived from the French chansonnier tradition: he said that Georges Brassensas was his greatest inspiration and that he was also influenced by Jacques Brel and Charles Trenet. He was admired by, and influenced, many well-known performers, including Jarvis Cocker, Mike Harding, Ralph McTell, Morrissey and Jasper Carrott.


One of his best known numbers, the satirical

love song "Lah-Di-Dah", concerned a new fiancé's declaration to his love, repeating the refrain "lah-di-dah" as he assured her that he would put up with all her boring relations: "I'll be polite to your daddy! Frightfully lah-di-dah/ Although he always bores me to my boots/ I love you very much".

In "Sister Josephine" he describes the police arriving at a convent chasing after a wanted criminal masquerading as a nun: "Oh Sister Josephine/ Founder of the convent pontoon team/ They're looking through your bundles of rare magazines/ After Sister Josephine". Other numbers had a reassuring feel, even when they dealt with risqué subjects. "The Castleford Ladies' Magic Circle" recounted how its members liked to indulge in satanic orgies, then "pop off home for cocoa and The Epiloque". Another concerned



The pub itself is the Black Swan in York, which has a regionally important historic interior and is where he used to drink when he lived in the city. 
